

A Brief History of St. Peter's Lischey's United Church of Christ


St. Peter's Lischey's traces its beginnings to **Rev. Jacob Lischey**, a Swiss-born Moravian preacher who came to America in 1742. In **1750**, he received a tract of land in Codorus Township (now North Codorus) where he built his home, gathered worshipers, and organized an **independent congregation** made up of Moravians, Reformed, and Lutherans. A **log church** was erected on his farm, and the earliest cemetery—still containing about a dozen stones, including those of his wives Mary Benezet (d. 1754) and his second wife (d. 1812)—was established there. Rev. Lischey himself was buried there in 1781.

After Lischey's death, the congregation became formally organized under the German Reformed Church in 1784, while still cooperating with local Lutherans. By 1806, a **second log church** and schoolhouse were built on land downhill from the present site. In 1811, the congregations purchased five acres for a new cemetery, as the original burial ground near Jefferson Road was difficult to maintain.

As the congregation grew, a **third church**, a brick building with galleries on three sides, was built in the 1840s near the cemetery. By the 1890s, the decision was made to relocate once more, this time to the top of the hill. The **fourth church building**, constructed of brick, was dedicated on **December 13**, **1896**. Its cornerstone, laid on Whitmonday that year, marked the beginning of a new era. The building cost over \$7,200, largely supported by the sacrificial giving and labor of the congregation.

For generations, St. Peter's was a **Union Church**, with both Lutheran and Reformed congregations sharing the same building, alternating services, and maintaining joint Sunday School. Over time, the charges and pastoral leadership changed, but the congregations continued in partnership. In 1965, St. Peter's U.C.C. became a separate charge with its own pastor. After years of discussion, the Lutheran and U.C.C. congregations officially **merged on March 1, 1985**, forming the present **St. Peter's Lischey's United Church of Christ**.

Today, the church honors its long history—from the earliest frontier log church and cemetery to the present sanctuary on the hill—continuing the faith legacy begun by Rev. Lischey more than **275 years ago**.



Guest Pastor

We warmly welcome **Rev. Dr. Doyle Luckenbaugh** as our guest pastor today at St. Peter's Lischey's UCC. Thank you for joining us and sharing your gifts of faith and leadership in worship.

The Rev. Dr. Doyle A. Luckenbaugh was born and raised on a farm near Spring Grove, Pennsylvania. A proud veteran, he served three years in the United States Marine Corps before pursuing his academic and theological education. He holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Catawba College in Salisbury, North Carolina, a Bachelor of Divinity and Master of Divinity degrees from Lancaster Theological Seminary in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, and a Doctor of Ministry degree from Ashland Theological Seminary in Ashland, Ohio.

Dr. Luckenbaugh served two congregations in Pennsylvania before relocating to Ohio, where he ministered to the Suffield United Church of Christ and the Church in Silver Lake. He concluded his active ministry as Senior Pastor of Bethany UCC in Ephrata, Pennsylvania, retiring in 2001.

Throughout his ministry, Dr. Luckenbaugh has been a passionate advocate for civil rights and social justice. In 1964, he traveled to Canton, Mississippi to participate in the voter registration drive, and in 1973, as a delegate to the UCC General Synod in St. Louis, he flew to California to stand in solidarity with César Chávez and the United Farm Workers. A lifelong supporter of women's reproductive freedom, he has worked closely with Planned Parenthood, continuing his advocacy work well into retirement.

Dr. Luckenbaugh has been honored with numerous awards, including the 1998 *Allen Meck Award for Excellence in Ministry* from Lancaster Theological Seminary, the 2000 *Kit Howell Progressive Voice Award* from the Alliance for Tolerance and Freedom, and the 2009 *Betsy and Thomas Distinguished Service Award* from the Clergy Board of the National Planned Parenthood of America in Houston, Texas.

In retirement, he continues to serve others—volunteering weekly with the Habitat for Humanity East Central Ohio construction crew and promoting the work of Back Bay Mission in Biloxi, Mississippi, among churches across Ohio.

Dr. Luckenbaugh has been married to the former Marian Elizabeth Douglass for over 66 years. Together, they are the proud parents of two children, grandparents to five, great-grandparents to six, and also have one step-grandchild. They currently reside in the Pebble Chase Condo Association on Wales Road in Massillon, Ohio.


