# Welcome to Our Guest Speaker, Chris Stoup...



We are pleased to welcome **Chris Stoup** as our guest speaker for **Veterans Sunday**. Chris is a former member of the **U.S. Air Force** and now serves with the **Transportation Security Administration (TSA)**. We thank Chris for joining us today and for sharing his time, experience, and perspective as we honor all who have served our country.

Chris Stoup, a native of York, began his service to his country on September 11, 2001 when he enlisted in the United States Air Force at the age of 18. After completing basic military training, he went through technical school to become an Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) technician. As an EOD technician, Chris was trained to disarm explosive, nuclear, chemical, and biological weapons of both military and improvised design, applying these skills during two combat tours in Iraq in support

of Operation Iraqi Freedom while defeating more than one hundred Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs). During his time in the Air Force, Chris also had the opportunity to work with the U.S. Secret Service (USSS), providing counter-IED expertise during USSS VIP protective missions, as well as, to provide support for F-117 and F-22 stealth fighter aircraft operations. Chris separated from the Air Force as a Staff Sergeant in 2007, but his service did not end there.

In 2008, Chris was hired by the Transportation Security Administration as an Explosives Specialist supporting the Charlotte-Douglas airport in North Carolina. While in Charlotte, he concurrently obtained his bachelor's degree in chemistry from the University of North Carolina at Charlotte, graduating Magna Cum Laude. Several years later, he was hand-selected for a position at TSA headquarters' Explosives Operations Branch in Arlington, VA, where he was responsible for overseeing portions of the national Explosives Specialist program. Present day, Chris works in TSA's Inspection office and runs one of TSA's national covert testing programs.

Chris is a foodie at heart. He loves to share great meals with friends and family, whether dining out or doing the cooking himself. His specialties are Eggs Benedict, Lasagna, and Panang Curry. In his free time, he also enjoys spending time outdoors hiking and camping, rooting for the Washington Capitals, and playing any game in the Legend of Zelda franchise. His most recent undertaking was adopting a kitten named Indy (short for Indiana Jones), with the intent of training him to become an adventure cat who will join him on a variety of endeavors.







# Veterans Sunday Spotlight: Staff Sergeants Janet and Ken Brown, USAF

Every year on Veterans Sunday, St. Peter's Lischey's UCC pays tribute to the men and women who are serving or have served our country in the armed forces. Some are current church members, many are buried in our cemetery, and a few are lost on battlefields far from home. As part of this annual tribute, we cast a spotlight on members of our congregation who answered the call to duty and proudly served our country. This year's spotlight shines on **Staff Sergeants Janet and Kenneth Brown**, both of whom served in the **United States Air Force** during the 1970s.

Both born and raised in York County, Pennsylvania, Ken and Janet Brown's stories share a common beginning that would one day become a shared journey of service. Ken was born at home, delivered by a doctor who came to the house. His father, Eugene Brown, had served in the Army Air Corps during World War II as a medic, and his mother, Dorothy Brown, worked for Danskin. Janet was born to Theodore and Alice Fake—Theo, a farmer, and Alice, a homemaker—but she was lovingly raised by her aunt and uncle, Lawrence and Anna Rodes. Her uncle, a World War II Army veteran who served in the South Pacific, later worked as the postmaster in Mt. Wolf, while her aunt cared for their home and also served in the local school cafeteria.

Both Ken and Janet attended **York Vo-Tech**, where their paths first crossed. Ken studied electronics, while Janet completed the health assistant program and went on to work as a dental assistant after graduation. Ken enlisted in the Air Force in 1973 during his senior year, and Janet—after the two married in December of that same year—decided to enlist the following summer. Though there was no guarantee that they would be stationed

together, providence smiled on them, and they were both assigned to **McConnell Air Force Base** in Wichita, Kansas.

Ken's Air Force career began with basic training at Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, Texas, followed by advanced instruction in missile electronic systems at Sheppard Air Force Base, also in Texas. He was then assigned to McConnell Air Force Base in Wichita, Kansas, where he trained to work on Titan II missiles—an assignment that took him deep underground into highly secure missile silos stretching ten stories below the surface. The work was demanding and unpredictable. Ken often logged long hours and was sometimes flown by helicopter to remote sites when urgency called. His first helicopter ride quickly became memorable when the pilot, knowing it was Ken's maiden flight, decided to pull a prank—tilting the aircraft sharply until a dummy in the copilot seat "fell out." As the crew roared with laughter, Ken clung to anything within reach, convinced he might be next. Despite the pressure and high stakes of missile operations, Ken excelled through his technical skill, discipline, and leadership. He rose to become a Master Technician, Master Team Chief, and Quality Control Evaluator, earning the rank of Staff Sergeant before his discharge in 1980.

Janet's journey was equally remarkable. She completed basic training at Lackland Air Force Base, then attended jet engine mechanic school at Chanute Air Force Base in Illinois, one of only three women in her class. Her small hands proved useful in the shop, allowing her to reach tight spaces others could not. She was the only woman in her maintenance shop at McConnell, earning the respect of her peers and supervisors through hard work and competence. After more than a year in the jet engine shop, she transitioned into an office role where she handled personnel reports, discharges, and other clerical duties—steady, essential work that provided her with more predictable hours as she and Ken started a family.

The Browns' years of service were marked by commitment and sacrifice. Life in the military was not easy—especially being far from home while raising two young children, **Kenny and Breanna**, without family nearby. Still, they persevered, finding strength in each other and in their shared sense of duty.

When their service ended in 1980, Ken and Janet went through out-processing together—a military version of "checking out," but with way more paperwork. Among the many departments they had to visit, one stood out to Ken: the career office. The Air Force likes to encourage members leaving active duty to consider joining the Reserves or the Air National Guard. The career officer asked what jobs they'd each held. Ken answered first, and before he could finish his sentence, the officer literally pivoted—turned his whole body away from Ken—and focused all his attention on Janet. Apparently, the Air Force Reserves didn't have a need for whatever Ken was doing, but could always use more Janets. After their discharge, they remained in Kansas for three years before returning to York to care for Ken's mother following the passing of his stepfather. Both took advantage of the **G.I. Bill** to

attend **YTI Career Institute**—Janet studying computerized accounting and Ken updating his electronics training to keep pace with advancing technology.

In civilian life, Ken worked as a **service technician for paper handling and paper cutters**, traveling to 47 states and numerous countries. Janet served with the **York County Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA)**, helping high school dropouts learn life skills and prepare for their GEDs. Janet also dedicated much of her time to childcare for her expanding family. Both retired after long and faithful careers.

Their spirit of service did not end with the Air Force. Janet and Ken joined the **American Legion in Shiloh**, and they both went on to serve **with the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary**. Ken has been serving for over 28 years. Through the Auxiliary, they have supported boating safety operations, mostly along the Susquehanna River and other locations — patrolling, and assisting those in need. Another mission of the Auxiliary is to fill in for active-duty Coast Guard personnel when needed.

Looking back, both Janet and Ken believe that military service helped shape their lives for the better. The Air Force instilled in them a deep sense of **discipline**, **teamwork**, **and responsibility**. Janet often reminds others—especially young people—of the importance of structure and safety, joking that her time in the service made her forever wary of "horseplay." Ken credits his time working on missile systems for teaching him to **document everything and trust in teamwork**—lessons that stayed with him throughout his civilian career.

For future generations, the Browns hope young men and women will take time to explore the many training and career opportunities available through military service—not only for the valuable skills it provides but also for the personal growth and discipline it inspires. Janet encourages all veterans to take full advantage of their VA benefits, a resource she believes too many overlook. They also encourage young people to consider vocational and technical education as another excellent pathway to meaningful and rewarding careers.

Whether on the battlefield, in our communities, or in our daily lives, may we, too, live with a warrior spirit—standing firm in faith, guided by God's purpose, and ready to serve where He leads.

Janet and Ken, thank you for your service. You are part of a long tradition of the men and women at St. Peter's Lischey's who served their country and went on to serve their communities by being active, productive citizens.
